"You've come a long way, baby, to get where you've got to today..."
Now women have the right to join men in the empty ritual of okaying the choices of corrupt politicians, and to make our "freedom" complete, we have our own cigarette.

Well, we haven't even begun to get where we want to be, and voting and smoking will never get us there. Women will have freedom when we destroy the myth of male supremacy, that ancient concept that didn't even flinch in 1920 when American women won suffrage, and continues, as it has from the beginning of civilization, to destroy the human potentialities of one sex for the convenience, pleasure and profit of the other.

Ideologically drawing on an exaggeration of physical abilities, and false analogies flowing from sexual physiology and reproduction, the myth demands that people be divided from birth along sexual lines and that they be groomed to act out separate and exclusive roles. Separate and unequal. Holes in the fabric of analogy and exaggeration are patched up with mysticism and Freudian theory, unproven and incapable of proof, via magazine culture and pseudo-scientific sociology and psychology.

Oppression of women operates on the domestic and societal levels, and most women get it both ways. The self-interest of individual men and super-profits for business are interdependent and mutually reinforcing, both depending on the myth for their perpetuation.

On the domestic level, husbands use their wives as maid services, baby sitters and sexual objects. Women who work have the additional job of doing all the household tasks. Saturated from childhood with male vanity, men never consider that women demand more out of life than being pretty, pleasing and sexy for men.

Business reaps a double profit from the oppression, at the consumption level, and more importantly, at the production level. Advertising has created the super-consumer housewife by brainwashing women into believing that feminine fulfillment can be found in things, rather than in self.

The biggest profits for business, however, come from using women to depress the wage level for all workers. By conjuring up artificial sex-differentiated job categories, business excludes women as a group from entire professions and skilled job areas, relegating them to the lowest paying, most monotonous, dirtiest jobs. When women have been able to break through and work at the same jobs as men, equal pay laws are blatantly disregarded.

In the broader social context, women are denied the right to terminate their unwanted pregnancies, and at the same time are pressured into sexual relationships by the stereotypical expectations of society.

Protesters and Police Clash Briefly

A day-long series of "counter inaugural" protest activities flared into disorder briefly yesterday at a Smithsonian Institution reception for Vice President-elect Spiro T. Agnew as mounted policemen charged into a crowd of about 1,500 amid a shower of debris hurled by demonstrators.

The melee outside the Museum of History and Technology in early evening was the worst incident of a day that saw some 6,000 protesters from various New Left groups stage a "wrong way" counter-inaugural parade down Pennsylvania Avenue, led by about 50 active-duty servicemen.

The parade was basically orderly but there were several minor scuffles with police. During the day police said, 19 persons — 16 men and 3 women — were arrested and charged with disorderly conduct. Two U.S. Park Policemen were treated for injuries at the Washington Hospital Center and released.

As the parade broke up in front of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration headquarters at 600 Independence Ave. SW, about a quarter of the crowd walked across the Mall to the Agnew reception that was beginning about 5 p.m.

For about half an hour, protesters crowded around the Mall

entrance to the museum, jeering arriving guests and throwing debris at some who had to walk through the ranks of the dissidents to get to the ceremony. There were no reports of injuries.

Then, the scene suddenly became a mass of running protesters, swinging billy clubs and mounted policemen charging into the crowd as slats, torn from park trash disposal baskets, were hurled by the protesters.

The disorder was triggered when clods of dirt and other objects were tossed at police, and shouts of "Pig" and "Sieg Heil" began to fill the area.

One officer ordered two men in a tree to come down, then began clubbing one as he hung from a branch. One protester, blood streaming down his face, was treated for an inch-long gash in his scalp.

"I don't know who hit me," he said calmly, "I was hit from behind."

Among the policemen injured was Park Police Deputy Chief A. D. Beye, who was struck with a board.

Dark Brings Stalemate

As it became dark and increasingly colder, police and protesters faced off in a stalemate for about 45 minutes.

Then the crowd began to thin and people drifted off toward the

counter-inaugural tent, at 15th Street and Independence Avenue, for the evening "ball."

The dissidents' day began with a 90-minute rally in the tent, erected by the sponsoring National Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam. Permission for the protest activities and a site for the tent was given late in the week by the federal government, with the proviso that the tent come down this morning.

Kathleen Cleaver, wife of Black Panther Eldridge Cleaver, did not show up as announced, and the rally was short, as such events go.

After folk-singer Phil Ochs performed several numbers, Mobilization chairman David Dellinger announced "just one more speaker, a wounded GI who got out of his hospital bed to come here."

The crowd in the tent, which a moment earlier had been shouting to get on with the march, suddenly fell silent as Derrick Alexander, a 25-year-old soldier from Florida, walked to the microphone.

Alexander's right arm is missing. He has a deep scar in his forehead running back across his scalp. Both are the result of wounds he received in Vietnam, he said.

He laughed self-consciously and told the audience that he wasn't accustomed to speaking before crowds. But nobody said

a word as he told them, "I represent a relatively new contingent of the peace movement... men in uniforms themselves."

After he was wounded, he said, "I decided my mission was to do whatever is humanly possible to end the war." Alexander said his father is a Navy captain now assigned to the Gulf of Tonkin, off Vietnam.

Halting, Noisy March

The march, which stretched for blocks past sparse Sunday crowds, was halting and noisy, with leaders constantly stopping the line to close up ranks.

Marchers momentarily surrounded a police patrol wagon on 3rd Street NW, prompting Deputy Chief Raymond Pyles to call for reinforcements, and about 10 marchers were arrested near the end of the march at 6th and Independence Ave. SW.

A weird confrontation between different factions of the crowd took place in front of the NASA building.

As marchers poured into the courtyard in front of the building, one ultra-militant group surrounded the flagpole and began to shout for the American flag be pulled down. But after tugging by opposing groups, it was left up.

The ball, which was held up when organizers ran out of fuel for their diesel generator to heat their tent and were rescued by

fuel supplied by the District, was loud, swinging and jam-packed.

The scheduled climax of the ball was the "in-hog-uration," the swearing in of a pig.

Disruption Hinted

About 200 of the more extreme protesters gathered this morning at Franklin Park, K Street between 13th and 14th Sts. NW to plan activities concerning the parade.

While they gave no details, speakers intimated that there would be some sort of attempted disruption.

One helmeted young man said, "The Mobilization Against the War in Vietnam people are going to be along the route. All we have to do is get together and think alike and we can lead them, because they don't know what they're doing." The groups represented at the park included Students for a Democratic Society and Youths Against War and Fascism.

Capt. Theodore Zanders of the District police spoke with the protesters briefly and explained to them that police would assist them in getting to the parade route if they caused no trouble. But he also warned that police would be on the lookout and they would be promptly arrested for any infractions of the law.

Two arrests did occur when youths apparently grappled for possession of a Viet Cong flag.

New Left Begins Its Protest Over Inauguration

March and an All-Night Rock 'Ball' With Pig Ceremony Set for Capital Today

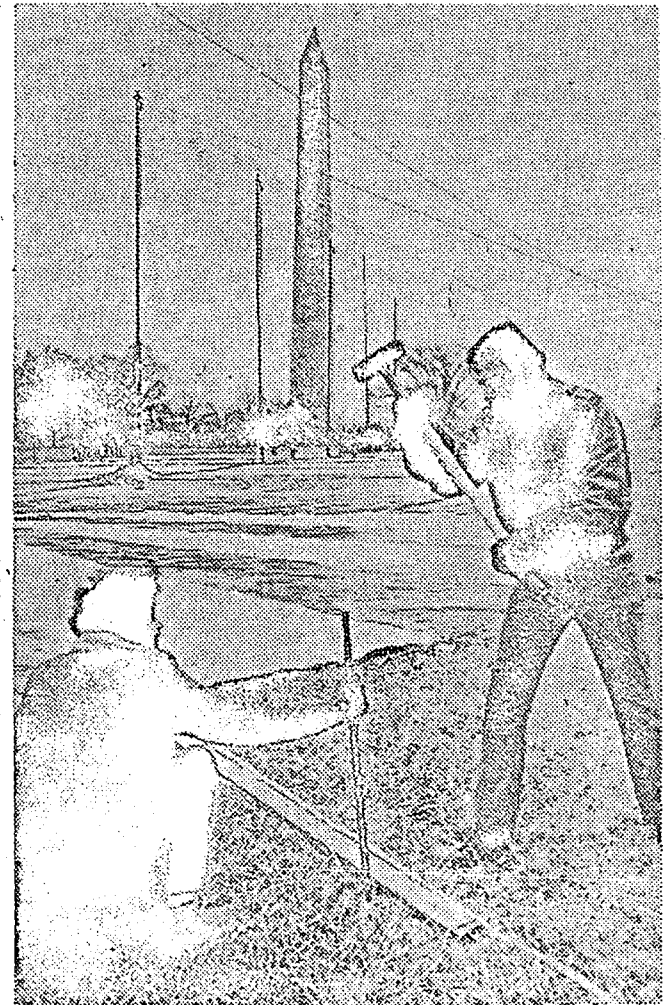
WASHINGTON, Jan. 18—The first large protest demonstration at any of the 45 inaugurations in the Presidency's 180 years began here today with a New Left display of youthful irreverence of the world and—particularly—of Richard M. Nixon and the Republican party.

Hundreds of long-haired young people, most in the standard nonconformist uniform of a navy pea jacket and bell-bottom blue jeans, began gathering here for a day of pre-inaugural workshops.

The topics ranged from "antidraft work" "guerrilla theater," and "campus rebellion" to "corporate power in America," "the grape boycott" and "repression of the liberation movement in Portuguese Angola and Southern Africa."

The youths, mostly white, were the vanguard of thousands of counter-inaugural demonstrators that the National Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam has summoned here for three days of protests.

The committee is the same loose coalition of antiwar, anti-establishment groups that

sponsored the disturbance at the Pentagon in 1967 and the marshaling of thousands of youth at the Democratic National Convention in Chicago last August.

"March and 'Ball' Today

The protest schedule includes an antiwar march tomorrow afternoon from the vicinity of the Washington Monument to the east end of The Mall, at the foot of Capitol Hill. It will be followed by a counter-inaugural ball from 7 P.M. to dawn in a rented circus tent erected under a Government permit on a corner of The Mall.

The counter-inaugural ball will feature "heavy" rock and folk performers and a program of satiric "underground theater." It will include the "inhoguration" of a pig as symbol of youthful contempt.

On Monday, the nation's real

inauguration day, thousands of demonstrators are scheduled to be in the reviewing stand and on foot along the Pennsylvania Avenue parade route with peace placards, songs and chants.

According to protest leaders, there is to be no planned "physical disruption or confrontation," nor any violence.

But the leadership has constantly qualified such assurances to Government and inaugural committee officials with the disclaimer that "we can't control everybody."

The mood of the young people arriving here was unmistakably militant. At headquarters in the Hawthorne School in southwest Washington, the walls were covered with posters declaring "Wall Street's war system must be smashed" and "Nixon—tool of billionaires' rule." Book stalls selling "Thoughts of Chairman Mao Tse-tung" seemed to be doing a brisk trade.

Another item that was a quick sellout at \$1 apiece was a white plastic mask that was a likeness of President-elect Richard M. Nixon. At the workshop on "guerrilla theater" today, owners of the masks who plan to attend Monday's official inaugural ceremony and parade were instructed to mass together "to reflect Nixon's facade back at Nixon."

The masks are also to be used in "street theater" skits that are to be part of tomorrow's protest march. According to plans, the parade is to be led by servicemen and Vietnam veterans carrying a coffin described as symbolic of death in the Vietnam war.

But at a news conference day, David Dellinger, chairman of the National Mobilization Committee, and Carl Rogers, head of Vietnam Veterans Against the War, charged the Army had restricted the area bases to limit participation by antiwar servicemen. Rogers said that, according to a few servicemen, only a few servicemen take part.

"The Government is feverishly trying to keep G.I.'s the antiwar movement a secret," Mr. Dellinger said.

Even if the political corner of the long inaugural weekend here kept at a minimum, the demonstrators already appear to have made an impact on the Republicans. One Republican here said their presence "at this dignified moment" was symbolic of what he called "degeneration gap."

Paul Potter, a coordinator of the weekend gathering, said today's workshops were representative of the chaotic nature that in some way is to the cacaphony of the things that go on the ment.

The discussion group "how to liberate women" produced the afternoon's overt counter-inaugural activity. About a dozen women in hippie dress marched out of the Hawthorne School where the sessions were to picket the inaugural committee's distinguished reception at the National Gallery of Art. There was a soaking drizzle.

Tight Security Shield Devised for Inauguration

WASHINGTON, Jan. 18—The tightest security ever devised for a Presidential inaugural will be enforced here Monday for the protection of President Johnson and President-elect Richard M. Nixon.

Working with the city's Metropolitan Police Department and six Federal law enforcement agencies, the Secret Service has fashioned a protective screen to foil any attempts to get through to the two men. The screen has many parts—all ready to drop into place on signal from the Secret Service director, James J. Rowley.

On the inaugural stand in front of the Capitol and the pavilion in front of the White House on Pennsylvania Avenue, a protective shield of thick bulletproof glass has been installed. Just behind the front panel, additional flanking panes extend back diagonally to deflect a bullet from any angle of fire.

Along the parade route down Pennsylvania Avenue from the Capitol, all manhole covers will be locked shut. Roofs of Government and other buildings will be cleared of all but uniformed personnel. Special identification will be required of any persons entering the buildings along the route—including permanent tenants.

Confetti Prohibited

Confetti and streamers are prohibited as windows along the route must be kept shut at all times.

The names of all persons who plan to stand behind those windows must be submitted to the local police—on Secret Service orders—a week in advance. Without his special card for the day, a regular tenant of an office building along the route will not be admitted to his own office.

The tightest security—and the least apparent—will be in and around the inaugural and reviewing platforms. Atop both structures and concealed from the thousands of persons crowding the Capitol plaza and along Lafayette Square across from the executive mansion, special agents will be surveying the scene with wide-angled scanning devices and will have automatic weapons ready.

Nobody in authority will say officially how many men and women will make up the protective guard. One police official who said he did not know the whole story made a quick estimate of 7,000. These will

include 3,200 Metropolitan Police officers plus 300 reserve officers on special assignments.

Their numbers will be swollen by 80 plainclothesmen, including chiefs of police, from New Hampshire to Los Angeles. Mostly, the visiting policemen were selected as a political reward. Congress voted \$16,500 to finance their trips. But 23 will be coming from New York, Philadelphia and Chicago because of their ability to spot pickpockets, confidence men and psychopaths.

In addition, 7,700 National Guardsmen will be on constant alert throughout the day and night. Half of these will be assigned to police patrol cars in outlying areas of the city to release as many regular patrolmen as possible for duty downtown and for traffic control.

What the rest of the guardsmen will be doing is a closely kept secret. But it is known that the Guard is determined not to be caught flat-footed in event of any mass disturbance. Highly mobile units will be prepared to move men and weapons to any point in the city.

The same goes for the 10,000 regular troops of the military district of Washington who will line the parade route and form the honor cordon on the Capitol plaza and at the reviewing pavilion in front of the White House. The troops will carry no weapons. But as one officer put it: "The Army always must be in a state of constant readiness," whether the problem be one of racial violence, a Yipie demonstration or any other form of civil disorder.

Only the Secret Service knows just how many security personnel will be on hand for the inaugural; numbers are part of its security planning and are top secret.

But for more than a month the new data processing machinery of the service has been turning out information on the names and movements of potential threats to the life of those it guards. Local and other police forces as well as 11 Federal enforcement agencies have contributed to this process.

The list of "potentials" runs into the thousands and includes anyone who has ever written a threatening letter or spoken

in public about killing a person for whose safety the Secret Service is responsible. The orders are that if any one of them shows up at an airport, bus terminal or the railroad station, he should be detained for "polite questioning."

An unidentified office building downtown is the "command post" of the Secret Service for the occasion. It has no markings on its doors. But on Inauguration Day it will be one of the busiest places in town. It is cluttered with electronic equipment using ultra-high frequencies capable of sending and receiving voice, and visual communications.

At the turn of a switch or a dial, the command post agents can communicate with a hundred-odd associates scattered among the critically secure areas at the Capitol and along the parade route. Their counterparts, carrying walkie-talkies, will be relaying any sign of suspicious movement in any area of proximity to the President or Mr. Nixon.

Any sudden or unusual move by anybody in the huge stands surrounding the inaugural or reviewing stands can be relayed instantly to an agent or detective in that sector from the command post.

Men familiar with the service look on all the security preparations as "routine." But they are the first to say that "when the life of the President or President-elect is concerned nothing is routine."

The assassination of President Kennedy and the report of the Warren Commission on that tragedy changed things for the men described in that report as the "elite corps." They are constantly aware of the fiat laid down in the report that "the protection of the President must be thorough but inconspicuous to avoid even the suggestion of a garrison state."

But there will be nothing inconspicuous about the protective shield as President Johnson drives to the Capitol from the White House with Mr. Nixon nor, again, when the new President returns to the mansion without his predecessor.

Going and coming, an Air Force helicopter loaded with Secret Service agents will be hovering over head. Another police helicopter will be patrolling several blocks off the parade route, and scout cars and patrolmen on foot will be scouring what the service calls the "outer periphery" for any signs of unusual activity.

1 WE DEMAND that the National Guard presence in Wilmington be terminated and that the new administration commit itself publicly to this goal.

The National Guard has been in Wilmington since April 9. Every night, armed convoys patrol the streets of the black community, creating an atmosphere of military repression which in its all-pervasiveness affects the white community as well.

- * On April 27, twenty-two anti-war demonstrators were arrested for violating the city's ordinance prohibiting gatherings of ten or more people during a declared emergency. Eventually the city dropped the charges, thwarting a challenge to the law's constitutionality.
- * On April 29, a black man was killed by a Guardsman (an untrained clerk-typist) while in police custody. A week later a bill was introduced in the legislature, with the Governor's approval, providing legal immunity for Guardsmen.
- * When some sixty clergymen issued a statement opposing the Guard's presence, they were denounced by the Governor for preaching "what is next to revolution."
- * The legislature has voted to place monitors in the schools to police students. The Governor-elect favors the use of "police agents" for community work and plans store-front police precincts as "crime deterrents."

2 WE DEMAND that blacks being held for political reasons or under unreasonable conditions be released.

The presence of the Guard, which is more than ninety per-cent white, stands squarely in the way of efforts for political self-determination by Wilmington's black community. The police have used the Guard to cover the systematic destruction of young grass-roots leadership which had surfaced in the Wilmington Youth Emergency Action Council (WYEAC), a loose federation of one-time gang members now involved in community organization.

- * On August 25, a WYEAC van was fired upon and its occupants fled to a nearby house. They were convicted of unlawful entry, even though the occupant of the house said she would not have pressed charges had she known the reason for the entry.
- * On September 3, six WYEAC members were arrested in a deserted dump for possession and discharging of firearms. Several wore buttons reading "I am already drafted in the Black Liberation Army." This incident served to justify the continued presence of the Guard as a deterrent to the threat of guerrilla warfare from a mythical black army.
- * On October 23, a young black man was picked up by two FBI agents on suspicion of being an army deserter. The agents were set upon by a group of young men and the suspect escaped. Drawing their list of suspects from WYEAC payrolls, the police arrested thirteen persons.

During April, at least 372 persons were arrested. Wilmington's mayor put the figure as high as 714. Court records are in such disarray that not even officials are certain of the numbers arrested or the numbers still in jail.

3 WE DEMAND that corporation control of ghetto programs, white community agencies, public offices, and those areas of jurisdiction which should be held by people through their governments be severed.

Wilmington is a company town in a company state. The presence of overwhelming wealth and power in the du Pont family, the du Pont corporation, and related interests has kept both the white and the black communities docile and has discouraged independent thought or action. The corporate posture toward social change was suggested by du Pont vice president Donald Dawson when he said, "...our biggest obligation to all our publics is to earn a profit..."

- * The du Pont family represents the largest private concentration of wealth in the nation (some \$7.5 billion). Of a total population of 250,000 persons in New Castle County, 30,000 work directly for du Pont. In Wilmington, both newspapers, the leading radio station, three banks, and a vast amount of real estate are either owned directly or controlled by the du Ponts.
- * The new governor of Delaware is a long time du Pont executive and the new mayor of Wilmington is closely allied with the du Pont family.
- * The Greater Wilmington Development Council (GWDC), a private corporation financed by the Wilmington business community, withdrew its financial support from WYEAC when that agency was attacked by the McClellan committee in a set of one-sided hearings.
- * Downtown Wilmington, Inc., a joint venture of the GWDC and the city government, has unveiled a multi-million dollar revitalization program principally providing an industrial and retailing complex—a project substantially disproportionate with GWDC's slim efforts in the ghetto.

DEMONSTRATE

By now most of you know about the strike by the California Grape Pickers, and the consumer boycott of stores that sell California grapes. The boycott has been generally successful so far, but, with the incoming Nixon administration being as blatantly opposed to the strike as it is (the Johnson administration's attempts to subvert it were much subtler), we must begin to vigorously express our indignation at the government and the corporate-military structure that is now intentionally keeping people in poverty in order to enhance their own private interests.

DID YOU KNOW THAT:

- 1- In 1968, the Department of Defense had purchased \$12 million worth of California grapes. This is 15 times as many as in 1965 before the strike began, and twice as much as last year, when the strike and subsequent boycott of grapes began to take effect.
- 2- The government has refused to enforce Federal legislation prohibiting the importation of alien strikebreakers.
- 3- The Federal government pays huge sums of "welfare" in farm subsidies, such as free irrigation, and subsidies for not growing, to grape growers. (One LARGE grower in King County California receives more money in Federal subsidies than all the people on welfare in the state).
- 4- The government continues to ignore the flagrant violations of the health codes (no toilet facilities, no drinking water, etc.) that exist in the fields. The workers have no protective garments when the fields are sprayed with pesticides.

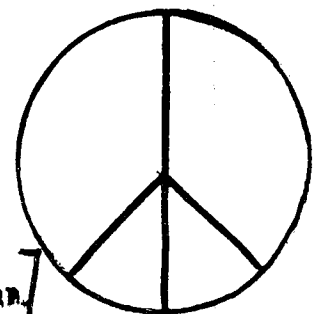

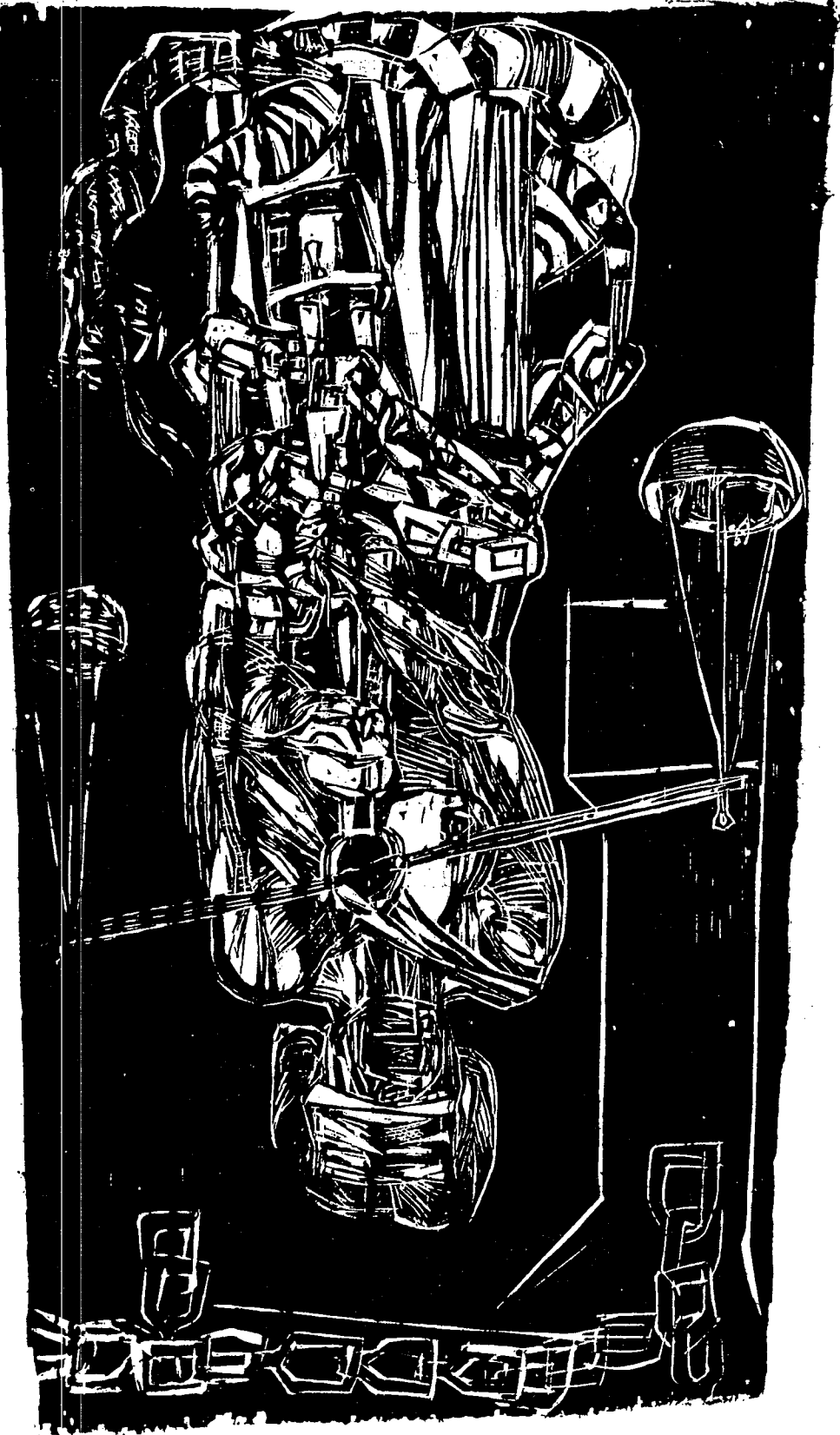

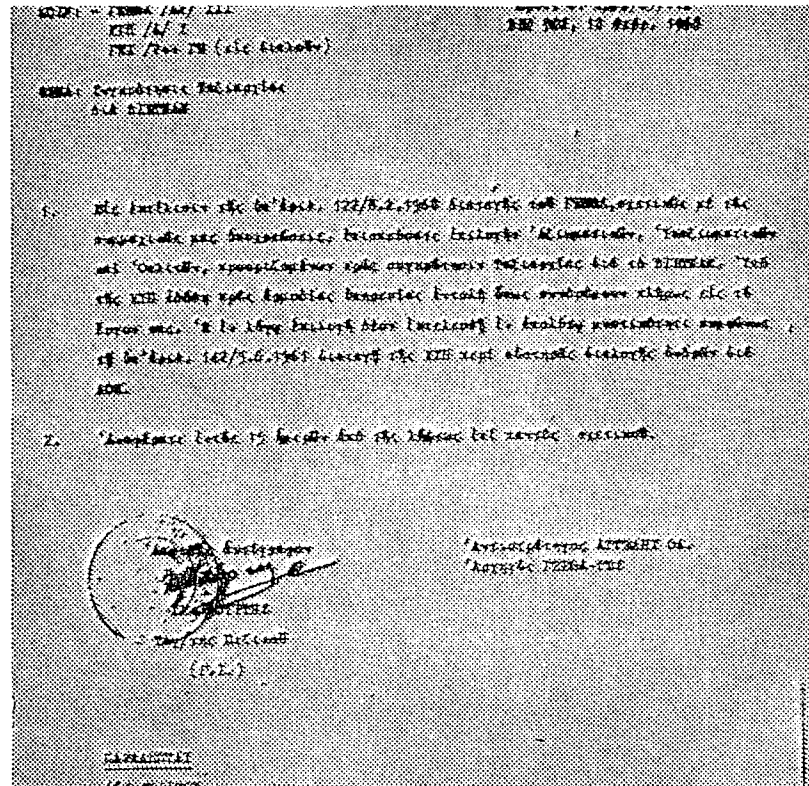

GREEK TROOPS FOR VIETNAM?



Above is a copy of a top secret order by a Greek Army Chief which reveals that the Athens Military Junta has made plans to send a brigade to help the Americans in Vietnam.

The copy has been published in the Cyprus paper "Haravgi" and the "Morning Star" and other European papers. The Junta in Athens have denied the report!!

Headed "Top Secret" and "Most Urgent" and dated "Ministry of National Defence General Staff, 2nd Bureau of Operations, 12.2.61," it said:

"1. The execution of No. 122/5.2.68 Order of GEETHA (General Staff of National Defence), regarding our obligations as allies, the selection of officers, N.C.O.s and soldiers, destined to form a brigade for Vietnam, must be speeded up. The above selection must be carried out in complete secrecy, in accordance with Order No. 142/5,6 1961 of the KYP regarding the strict selection of troops for the commando units.

"2. Report within fifteen days after the receipt of all data."

(The KYP referred to is the Greek CIA)

MESSAGE FROM THE GREEK ANTI-JUNTA MOVEMENT

We of the East coast Anti-junta committees, representing the Inter-Federation for Democracy in Greece, fully support the goals of the National Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam. We are committed to the movement for peace and social justice and we will continue to play our role in preventing this movement from being suppressed or ignored.

We join the Mobilization in greeting the incoming Nixon-Agnew administration with a firm recognition of what their "law and order" theme really is...war on the Black community and all other forces for progressive change in our society. But to us., as Greeks, the issue of law and order has special significance. For "law and order" is the central theme of the military dictatorship that now grips Greece.

In Greece, "law and order" means the suspension of freedom of speech, freedom of press and freedom of assembly. It means the abolition of political parties, labor unions and student organizations. It means the continual impoverishment of most of the Greek people while Greek ship-owners and their playmates cavort on their yachts. AND IT MEANS THE UNSPEAKABLE TORTURE OF THOUSANDS OF POLITICAL PRISONERS IN CONCENTRATION CAMPS AND ESTABLISHED BY THE JUNTA'S NAZI FOREBEARERS.

Let there be no mistake about where the responsibility for this state of affairs in Greece rests. It rests firmly with the United States government and with the interests that control it. It rests with the geo-political security managers of the Truman administration who, in the name of protecting democracy, supported the monarch-fascists in the Greek Civil War in 1948 and thereby founded a "doctrine" that to this day is used to justify American intervention in Vietnam. It rests with the CIA which worked night and day to undermine a democratically elected government that tried to effect reforms that would rescue Greece from the economic stagnation and the political repressions of the fifties. It rests with the American backers of military aid, without whose tanks and guns the present junta would fall in a matter of weeks. It rests with American business interests such as ESSO Pappas and Litton Industries who never miss an opportunity to support right-wing dictatorships that provide good security for investments.

And now...in 1969...it rests with our latest apostles of "law and order"...Nixon and Agnew...who predictably have praised the military dictatorship in Greece as a "stable and wonderful government".

We are committed to the destruction of the "stable and wonderful" Greek government that Nixon and Agnew love so well. We are committed to its replacement with a government that responds to the true needs of the Greek people for peace and social justice. As we march, our brothers and sisters in Greece are organizing to actively resist the fascist government, even at great cost of suffering. Therefore, we call on those with whom we march today, who have many times touched us with the dignity and eloquence of their struggle, to join us in supporting the Greek people in their struggle against enslavement at the hands of a government that has the full, official support of the United States, which seems intent upon interfering with the will and destiny of other peoples.
