THE.ARMY IS SPYING ON US

WASHINGTON -D.C. (LNS) — The U.S. Army has a nation-wide'"^MO \iement watching network, complete with informers and daily "intelligence" reports teletyped to bases across the country.

The center of the operation is near Baltimore, Md., at Fort Holabird where the U.S. Army Intelligence Command is located. Every day, Robert A. Brisentine, Jr., "TPMG Liaton Officer" for the Army's Criminal Intelligence Division (CID), signs the Daily m telligence Summary which is sent out over the wire from Fort Holabird to bases across the country.

"The U.S. Army Intelligence Command, Fort Holabird, Maryland, reported the following summary which contains- items of intelligence interest..." begins each dispatch. What follows is not limited to information about "illegal" activity within the Army, the Criminal Intelligence Division's area of jurisdiction, nor even to movement activities which might bring violence and a call for Army troops to restore "order." AP wire, edited so that it contains only stories about the activities of the left, rewritten in military jargon and embellished with tidbits, obviously from informers.

The Daily'Sumrnary could be composed subst ,tially of newspaper clippings, though most probably a large number of military personnel are involved in compiling it from first hand observation. But when the U.S. Army Intelligence Command puts out a "Special Summary" it becomes obvious that they have informers at work. Take for example, the "Special Summary" covering 0700 to 1800 hours of January 20 in Washington when demonstrators were reacting to Nixon's inauguration:

"At 1000 hours, a meeting of dissidents broke up at St. Stephen's and the Incarnation Church, 16th and Newton Streets, N.W., WDC. SO members from the Ohio and Micl:igan SOS contingents were present. After the meeting broke up into small groups., as they did not want to get 'busted' .before they could ge into action.

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Two members of the group were to go to Franklin Square. Neither Mark Rudd nor weapons were present at the meeting."

And this, from January 19: "Out-of-town dissidents currently in Washin2:ton are being housed in a 'commune' at .ddress deleted by LNS] along with 'Pigasus' and several dogs' who are permitted to move among; the persons sleeping on the floor but are not permitted to leave the build ng f r. fea f being seen. Four or five unidentified hippies ' announced plans to leave Washington for fear that it will be another Chicago and many of **the** dissidents have expressed their apprehension about police intervention in their demonstra--tions."

Before counter-inaugural demonstrators ever arrived in Washington, Army Intelligence was at work on the matter. Special summaries listed the number of buses and persons en route to Washington from major cities. And they had a full-fledged spy in Nashville, at least, who supplied them with more detailed "information:"

There were four (4) occupants in the car, [name deleted by LNS] a female Caucasian, [name deleted ... J personality data unknown, and two unidentified individuals. During the night of 16-17 Jan '69, [name deleted ...] had in his possession a .22 caliber bolt action rifle and 'more than 100 rounds of ammunition.' During the early morning hours of 17 Jan 69, the rifle and ammunition could no-t found at SSOC headquarters. [Name ...] also had with him a GI helmet bearing on the front a red star within a yellow circle with unknown lettering above and below the emblem. [Name ...], a SSOC high school coordinator, is believed to have an extensive arrest record in New Orleans, La., various places in North Carolina, and possibly other states, Also at 1430 hours one POV (Privately Owned Vehicle) with four (4) occupants and at 1530 hours another POV with five (5) occupants departe & SSOG Hqs--Na-shville-, allegedly enroute to Washington, D.C."

And, of course, the Daily Summary includes items about the establishment of GI coffeehouses, GI teach-ins and demonstrations, and cars with base parking stickers sighted near protest meetings.

For example: "Chapel Hill, N.C.: On 7 December, a crowd numbering approximately 120 staged a march from the Morehead Planetarium to the First Baptist Church. The Marchers carried placards reading "A Free Army in a Free Society,' 'Free Speech for Gis,' and 'Try War Criminals Not War Resisters.' The

March appeareg. to be led by Cha:1.1.e. Mann, a member of the United Anri-War Mcb1iiiation Front (UAWMF)."

In addition to th2 D11iy Sullmaty, the U.S. Army Intelligence Com3:Lind compi...:es and sends out "personality dar&."--dossiei-s on movement activists. The "personality data" is : reportedly classified "Top SecreL" But Army Intel1igence is interested in all dissent -- even that which threacens no violence. The Daily Summary for December 7, for example, carried this @ccount o:: civil rights demonstration in the South:

"Jeffersonvil.1.c, Ga.; Q, 6D(;'.ccmbOr, a group cf approximately 100 Negroes, 30% pGY cent of whom yere 18 years of age or younger, held a meeting at a Baptist. Church, and then. marched through the downtown area. The march was held m support of Negro demands. for a Negro Deputy Sheriff (reference USAINTC summaries 8339 and 8341), There were no incidents or. arrests. On i Deccmbey, several groups of five. per.sons each marched in and out' of the courthouse; but no distur-bar;.::es were reported. A group of 35 Negroes gathered at a church but, disbanded_.a short tirr1e J.ater and no organized demonstration occurrcd,"

In addition, the Daily Summary is interested in radical education and propaganda, for instance on December 30, it reported:

"SDS Week of Solidar1ty: The National SOS has been invited to send five observers to Cuba for the celebration of the Cuban Revolution on 2 January. The five peTSons will be chosen by the SOS National, 1n, trim Com11itc1,;; (NIC) . The N[C has al_so decided to call for a week of solidarity with Cuba fmm 3 u 10 ,Janu:JJ"y, This solidarity week wil ! consist mainly of an edu-. cational program: 1 with posters and educational material being prepared by the National Office of SDS." watch on the anti-1t1ar, anti-army movement among GI's? Yes. And checkrng out action against ROTC? Yes. And maintaining surveilance over the biac-k move-ment, particularly near big Army bases in the South, where "unrest" could send "cacial tensions" sky.rocketmg among GI's? Yes. And srndying demonstriltions which the Army may be called in to quell? Yes.

And more. The Army is paralleling, through its triminal In\estl gat.lon O1v1siOn, some of the spy work of the F.B.1'. Tlle CiD supplies the information to the U.S. Army Intellig,mce

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Command, which in turn reports to the Defen:::,e Intelligence Agency. As a result, the Defense Intelligence Agency has its own watchful eye on the radical movement in the Un.:ted Stat.es} with no need to rely on data from civilians.

Be careful. The Army is watching you. Not just when you're telling secrets, conspl.ririg Or totling guns, if you do -chai sort of thing. But in all your political actions. They're 1 atching you so they'll know how to destioy you. \fatch the Army. So we'll know how to destroy it.
